A young man walks into a church on Christmas Eve. He sits alone, near the back, and observes the crowd. The sanctuary hums with the quiet murmur of conversations. Wreaths and candles adorn the room. A tree strung in white lights stands to one side. But the young man's eyes are drawn to the table in the center. On the table, a loaf of bread and a chalice bear silent witness. This night is special.

Until he walked into the sanctuary, the young man had been out of step with the holiday spirit. Cheery music had surrounded him everywhere he went. People



were laughing and talking excitedly. Crazy drivers were on the roads. This was supposed to be a happy time of year. And there was no reason the young man should not have been happy. He was on a break from graduate school, where he was doing well. His family was together. He loved his parents and his brother and sister. They were close. His girlfriend was in town so they would be together on through the holidays. Life was good. He had no reason whatsoever to feel blue. But there was no denying it; he felt blue. Somehow the season felt hollow. The decorations, the songs, the parties—they were like a fog he was walking through.

He has read many people feel this way. They get depressed during the holidays. He wonders why. Maybe the expectations are too high. Christmas is supposed to

be magic. Reality rarely is. His family is as happy as any other, but he has never known a family like the one in the Publix commercial. Whatever the reason, he cannot shake his melancholy.

He ponders these things as he sits in the pew. The church slowly fills with people. He startles from his thoughts as Mrs. Baxter slides down the pew towards him. He smiles and nods. He has known her all his life, and he knows that about six months ago her husband died. They had been married more than fifty years. The young man is surprised to see her. The holidays are a brutal time for those who are grieving. Everything is the same but totally different. Every same thing only



## **Giving Trees**

Each December, the church is transformed with beautiful Christmas decorations, including the Giving Trees that grace the narthex of the sanctuary and the foyer of the HFLC. This year, the Mission Committee is coordinating the annual project that shines the love of Jesus to needy families in our community. So, while you are admiring the lovely decorations adorning the church, be sure to stop by the specially decorated Giving Trees, select an ornament and pledge to let your Christmas spirit sparkle this holiday season.

The gold ball ornaments represent the opportunity to donate a \$25 Walmart gift card to the residents of Dunklin Memorial Training Center and its sister organization, Refuge Ranch. Both organizations are faith-based, drug and alcohol rehabilitation programs located in our area. Residents have limited resources and Christmas is a challenging time of year for them. The gift cards give them an opportunity to purchase gifts for their family members. If you want to support this worthy cause, select a gold ball and go to the registration table located in the narthex and fover on December 2nd, 9th & 16th after each of the three services, and complete the commitment sheet with your contact information pledging to purchase a \$25 gift card. After buying the gift card, place it in an envelope labeled "Christmas Gift Cards" with your name on the outside, and return it to the church.

The other tree is decorated with angels. It represents the opportunity to help support the classrooms at the Gertrude Walden Child Care Center (GWCC) in East Stuart with much-needed classroom necessities. Church members wanting to participate should select an angel from the tree and take it to the registration table. At the table, you will choose an item to purchase and complete your contact information next to your selection. After buying the item, return it to the church as early as possible. Please be sure to tape your angel to your purchased item so we can track when supplies are received.

The deadline for returning both the Walmart gift cards and the school supplies is Monday, December 17th. They can be dropped off during the week in the church office or any Sunday morning in December at the registration tables in the narthex or foyer.

If for any reason you are not able to purchase your pledged item or gift card, please notify the church office immediately so the Mission Committee can make other arrangements. We don't want to disappoint

anyone.

Representatives from the Mission Committee will deliver the gift cards to Dunklin and Refuge Ranch and the classroom supplies to GWCC the week before Christmas, and welcome members of the congregation to join this annual mission outreach. Prayer Breakfast Lynn Church, Chairman, Deacon Prayer Team Committee

On November 3rd, as a follow up to October's sermon series "Learning to Pray," the Deacon Prayer Team hosted a prayer breakfast from 8:00-9:30 a.m. in Langill Hall with the theme "Praying Together — To God Be The Glory." Approximately 80 people gathered for this special event.

When guests were all seated at the decorated tables, John Sanders welcomed everyone and said an opening prayer. A delicious hot breakfast prepared by Charlie Rosseau and Carole Peterson was then graciously served by middle and high school youth who worked alongside the adults. It provided for a time of good fellowship.

After breakfast, John introduced the first of 3 speakers, Florine Blackshear. She preceded her words by singing the beautiful first verse of "Amazing Grace." It was powerful and touching. She followed the song telling about the great power of prayer in healing her cancer.

The next speaker was Dennis Mullen, who spoke about his recovery from a massive stroke. He thanked

church members for all of their prayers and how he especially remembered Bill Bangley visiting him right after he was hospitalized, of course carrying his bible. He also gave a special thank you to his wife, Michelle, for her loving care by quoting a Psalm.

Last but not least, the third speaker was Charles Rosseau, who told about the miraculous pregnancy, birth and heart surgery performed on his baby daughter, Sophie. He spoke about how the Lord and prayers brought Sophie and the family through that difficult time. He was accompanied on the stage by his wife, Mary, and Sophie, who smiled happily while he spoke.

After the speakers finished, a prayer leader at each table picked a prayer topic out of a large bowl. The people at each table then prayed, using that topic as a guide. The prayer time lasted about 20 minutes. Then a closing prayer was given by Pastor David.

A special thank you to everyone who gave of their time and talents to make this prayer breakfast a success. We especially thank our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. To God Be The Glory! This program features biblical, Christ-centered teaching that focuses on grief topics associated with the death of a loved one. The DVD seminar features nationally respected grief experts and real-life stories of people, followed by a small group discussion about what was viewed. Past participants have related how helpful the information and follow-up discussions were to them.

Many grieving people find they are only beginning the work of healing when friends or family have returned to their daily life routines. Too often people, including Christians, tend to stuff their grief instead of allowing it to do the God-given work for which it is intended. Don't allow fear of what others may think to keep you from what could help you. Confidentiality is very much a part of this program.

Your bereavement experience may be recent or not so recent. You will find encouragement, comfort and help in grieving the death of a spouse, child, parent, sibling, another family member, or friend. No matter what the cause of your loved one's death, this is an opportunity to be around people who understand what you are feeling. You will learn how to recognize

the symptoms of being stuck in grief, and that you do not need to live in bondage to certain emotions. You will learn valuable information about facing your "new normal" in life and renewing your hope for the future.

## Journey of Generosity Q&A



Last month, Carlin Rykse introduced PCPC to Journey of Generosity (JOG). Pastor David caught up with her recently to ask some of the questions buzzing around the congregation. David: What is a Journey of Generosity (JOG)? Carlin: Each of our lives is part of a bigger story. God created each us for a purpose and had a plan

for our lives even before we were born. Embarking on this Journey of Generosity helps us discover how our finances fit into that purpose.

David: You got into the leadership of this because you had such a positive experience on your JOG. Tell me about that.

Carlin: When I was first invited to attend a JOG, I really had no idea of what to expect. Attending one opened my heart and mind to a deeper understanding of how God has uniquely equipped me. It gave me a new appreciation for my unique gifts. I began to see things differently and recognize where God was challenging me and opening new doors. It gave my life new meaning, and I wanted to share that with others. Sometimes we need to pause and pay attention to discover new insights and see things from God's perspective.

David: Why should a person participate in a JOG? Carlin: Anyone who is serious about opening their heart and mind to serve God will benefit in going through a JOG. We were designed by Him to serve and glorify Him. I want to know that I've accomplished His will on earth. I believe we all want to know that we ran the good race, so that when we meet Him face-to-face we hear his voice saying, "Well done, my good and faithful servant."

David: What would you say to someone who is hesitant to participate?

Carlin: We all have busy and complex lives. However, one of the benefits of attending a JOG is that you will walk away with more clarity and hope. You will have a vision for how to prioritize where you commit your time, use your talent, develop your gifts and invest your resources for God's glory. David: I understand no one will be asked for money at a JOG. Is that right?

Carlin: You're right. You will never be asked for money at a JOG. The purpose is to pause and really tap into God and to step into His divine plan for your life. You know, as long as God gives us breath, we are not finished with the work He intended for us. We should never stop discovering what He wants us to do with the resources He has entrusted to us.

PCPC wants to give everyone who wants to attend the chance to take a JOG in 2019. The first JOG will be February 22-23 for elders, deacons, and staff.

Pastor David will train small group leaders on Wednesday evenings, beginning January 9 and continuing until March 6. You are invited to learn how to lead a small group.

### What is a small group?

A small group has 6 to 12 people. Small group ministry can take many forms:

• The classic model—a group of people meets weekly (or bi-weekly or monthly) for fellowship, prayer, and Bible study. They may meet in a home, restaurant, or the church. Participants build relationships over time. Ideally, these groups should constantly be dividing to create new groups, but often they settle into a permanent group.

• The dynamic model—small groups form around a special study. For example, a six-week study on dealing with difficult people. Participants only commit to this six weeks. Ideally, another study would follow that one, so that something is always being offered, but the people who participate in any one group changes. This allows participants to meet more people over time.

• The support model—small groups are one part of a larger effort. For example, the next time Pastor David leads a Classics of Christian Spirituality study, he would like to speak for 40 minutes then have others lead small group discussions for 20 minutes.

### Why should you take this training?

• You already lead a small group and want to improve your skills.

• You want to organize a classic small group in your home or neighborhood.

• You want to organize a classic small group at PCPC.

• You are a high school student, and you feel this training could be valuable for campus ministry when you go to college.

• You aspire to join PCPC's Company of Small Group Leaders.

### What is PCPC's Company of Small Group Leaders?

The Company is a list of trained leaders the church can call on to lead dynamic model or support model small groups. We would like to have a list of 20 to 30 leaders. You would only have to make short-term commitments. For example, in the spring we have a church-wide effort called "Lent with Bonhoeffer." We will learn from and with Bonhoeffer what it means to follow Jesus. Part of this effort will be a six-week class on Wednesday evenings reading through Bonhoeffer's book *Life Together.* (It's about how he organized his underground seminary.) When we meet on Wednesdays, Pastor David will speak, then we will break into small groups for discussion. We need approximately 10 leaders to facilitate that discussion in small groups.

## Do I have to commit to leading a small group or being part of the Company to take the training?

No. You can take the training with no commitment.

### Is there a cost for the training?

No. There will be a book or two, for which we will ask a nominal suggested donation.

### Wow! I can't wait! How do I sign up?

reminds you how much has changed. Well-meaning friends push you to do things you don't feel like doing, paving the road with their good intentions. Or they ignore you when you wish they would push. He hopes she is being patient with herself. He makes a mental note to speak to her after the service.

He tries to get in the right mood as the singing starts, but it won't come. He belts out "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing"-his favorite. The church is so packed he can feel the voices. It feels good, but his mood does not lift. The blue is still there.

The pastor reads the scripture: "Unto you is born this day, in the city of David, a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." The sermon presses home the point: God became human in order to save us. Christmas commemorates an invasion. The light of heaven burst into this world to liberate us from sin and death.

The young man shuffles forward to receive the Lord's Supper. As he breaks the bread, he prays, "Thank you, Lord, for dying for me." As he dips it into the cup and eats it, "Thank you, Lord, for forgiving my sin."

After the service, he chats with a few people. As he steps out into the night, he still feels blue, but there is something else. He knows the lights and sounds and holiday glitz will never be significant to him. And that's OK. Because he knows the Savior. Christmas is not about all those other things. They can be fun. But you don't need them.

His Christmas blues deepen to a midnight hue, but in that darkness shines a star. As John said, "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." This is the paradox of Christmas: In the manger, God. In the darkness, tremendous joy.


