id I ever tell you about the time I met Santa Claus? Of course, he doesn't call himself that, nor does he wear a red suit or say, "Ho, ho ho!" He also does not believe in elves, although he likes J. R. R. Tolkien's Lord of the Rings trilogy. He told me, "I like it because Tolkien creates a fantasy world that is morally ordered along Christian lines." If there's one thing I've learned, it's never argue with a fourth century bishop about moral order.

A couple of years ago I was driving home from a conference. Being eager to get back, I pressed on late into the night. I missed dinner but eventually grew hungry. Civilization was spread thin in that part of the country, so my options were limited. Then I saw the familiar black letters in yellow boxes announcing the presence of a Waffle House at the next exit. That's my idea of fine dining, so I did not hesitate.

I sat at the counter, waiting for my meal, with no one in the place except a young couple at a booth, the waitress/cook, and me. Although I had not noticed headlights in the parking lot, the door opened. In walked an older gentleman. I say gentleman because although he did not appear affluent, he bore himself with the dignity of one who is comfortable with his place in the world. He looked around, decided against bothering the young couple, and approached me. "Mind if I sit down?" he asked.

"Please do," I answered. "Have you been on the road long?"

"Oh, no," he chuckled. "Not long. I'm meeting someone. And you?"

"Heading home. I've been at a conference."

"How interesting. What sort of conference?"

"It was for pastors."

"How wonderful! You are a pastor then?"

"Yes. I pastor a Presbyterian church in Mobile. I've been there 13 years."

Beginning in December, the church will be beautifully adorned with Christmas decorations, including the Giving Trees gracing the narthex of the sanctuary and foyer of the Huizenga Family Life Center (HFLC). The Mission Committee is coordinating this annual project that shines the love of Jesus to needy families in our community.

While admiring the lovely decorations, be sure to stop by the specially decorated Giving Trees to select one of the ornaments. The gold ornaments represent the opportunity to donate \$25 Walmart gift cards to residents of the Dunklin Memorial Training Center and the Refuge Ranch. Both organizations are faith-based, drug and alcohol rehabilitation programs based in our local area, and residents have limited resources. The gift cards give the residents an opportunity to purchase Christmas gifts for their family members. The other tree is filled with ornaments in the shape of footprints and titled "Soles for Souls." Each little footprint represents a child attending East Stuart's Gertrude Walden Child Care Center (GWCC) and identifies the child's name and his or her shoe size.

Church members who select a footprint ornament commit to purchasing sneakers and socks for that specific child. After choosing a footprint, you should go to the table that will be in the narthex and foyer on December 3rd and 10th following each of the three services to register your name next to your chosen child. After purchasing your child's shoes and socks, return the wrapped gift to the church office as early as possible. The deadline for submitting the gift shoes and socks and the Walmart gift cards is December 15th. If for any reason you find you are not able to purchase your gift, please notify the church office immediately so the Mission Committee can make other arrangements. We don't want to disappoint any of the children. Representatives from the Mission Committee will deliver the gift cards and all the shoe boxes to GWCC the week before Christmas and welcome any members of the congregation to join this annual mission outreach. I even heard a rumor old Saint Nick might go along when we make the deliveries! For more information or to offer assistance, call Janet in the church office.

And then be sure to mark your calendars! December 10th, the preschoolers from Gertrude Walden Child Care Center will be at PCPC to sing during the 9:30 service in the HFLC. Their performance is always a joy and sure to put everyone in the mood for Christmas.

I said, "Yes, but you were named after Saint Nicholas of Myra, the fourth century bishop who came to be known as Santa Claus?"

He paused, then said, "No, I was not named for him. I am he. But please, don't call me Santa Claus. Santa Claus is a marketing gimmick. I am just a simple servant of Christ."

He went on to tell me part of his story. He began his ministry during the reign of Diocletian, who persecuted the church. Nicholas spent time in prison because of his commitment to Christ. In fact, he was released only because Constantine became emperor and made Christianity a legal (and favored religion). I asked Nicholas, "Is the story true about you throwing a bag of gold into a poor family's house so that the three daughters would have a dowry?"

He laughed, "Yes, that's true. Their father was so proud and stubborn. He would not accept a gift, even to save his daughters. I had to sneak by at night and throw the money through the window. I could never admit that I did it, however. He would have returned it."

We had such an enjoyable conversation that I failed to ask the obvious question for a long time. Finally I asked, "Hey, if you are Nicholas of Myra, a bishop who died in 345 or 352, what are you doing at a Waffle House in rural Alabama late on a Thursday night?"

"I told you, I am here to meet someone. As it happens, I am here to meet you."

"Why me? Is this about the Red Ryder BB gun I never got for Christmas?"

"Mercy! No. Don't be ridiculous. You would have put your eye out. No, I am here to give you some important instructions."

"Instructions from Santa—sorry, I mean, from you?"

"Much higher up than that! I am just the messenger."

"What sort of instructions?"

"Are you familiar with a recently published report called 'The State of American Theology'?" I confessed I was not. "It reveals the findings of a survey commissioned by Ligonier Ministries and conducted by LifeWay Research."

"I'm guessing the results were not encouraging."

"Not especially. Although for the most part this is hardly surprising. Biblical illiteracy is an epidemic, even in churches. Ignorance of basic theology is the norm. ... And yet, there were a couple of findings that were particularly alarming."

'Such as?"

"Questions about who Jesus is. For example, people were asked whether they agree or disagree with this statement: 'Jesus is the first and greatest creature created by God.' As you know, the statement is false. Jesus is not a creature. He is God. As the holy gospel says, 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God' [John 1:1]. This statement about Jesus being a creature is a heresy taught by Arius, back in my day. It was condemned at the great Council of Nicaea in a.d. 325."

"You were at that council, were you not?"

"Indeed I was. When Constantine became Emperor and legalized Christianity, he found the churches divided and mired in controversy. Arius had influential and powerful friends. For a time, he held the upper hand. But his teachings contradicted the holy scriptures. Constantine called all the bishops together in a council. He presided himself. The council adopted a strong statement affirming the divinity of Jesus."

"I know, and all Christians believe it. But many outside the church charge that the outcome of the council was arbitrary. They claim it had more to do with imperial politics than religion."

"That's not true! Did politics play a part? Certainly. They always do when you are talking about a big group of people. Was the process messy in ways? I suppose. But I tell you, the Holy Spirit was at work. The council got it right, not because councils are infallible, but because we were led by the Spirit. The Creed we wrote is biblical."

"I had a professor who said the Creed is in the Bible

'in kit form'—some assembly required."

"A perfect description! And we assembled it. ... But now, it seems many Christians do not understand the most basic truths about Jesus. The survey found that 52% of Americans agreed with the statement that Jesus is a creature."

I said, "I can't say that's shocking. You have a lot of unbelievers, a lot of nominal Christians. I've heard that about 25% of Americans are serious disciples of Jesus, so 52% doesn't sound too bad. Though of course, we want it to be 100%."

"That's not the bad part. Among Evangelical Christians, the rate was worse, 71% of them agreed that 'Jesus is the first and greatest creature created by God.' Evangelicals, by definition, believe the Bible is the Word of God. And yet, 71% of them could not answer the most basic question about Jesus! Another question asked people to agree or disagree with this statement: 'Jesus is truly God and has a divine nature, and Jesus is truly man and has a human nature.' As you know, this is true. Among all Americans, 62% agreed. Evangelicals did better here, 85% agreed. Still, this is so basic and elementary the number should be 100% or at least 99%."

"I understand why the general population might not get this. You've got people out there who don't know anything about the Bible and all they know about Christianity is what they pick up from vampire movies. But believers ought to know the basics about who Jesus is. But why are you telling me this?"

"Because you've got to teach them. You are a Presbyterian pastor. There was a time, not long ago, when Presbyterian children learned the Westminster Shorter Catechism. Do you know question 21 of the catechism?"

"I know it from the Westminster Shorter Catechism in Modern English: Who is the redeemer of God's chosen ones? The only redeemer of God's chosen ones is the Lord Jesus Christ, the eternal Son of God who became man. He was and continues to be God and man, in two distinct natures, and one Person forever."

"I'm impressed!"

"Don't be. I got lucky. I've been teaching a catechism class."

"And that is what you must do, teach. Every man, woman, and child needs a relationship with Jesus Christ. How can they do that if they do not understand the most elementary biblical teachings about him? He is fully God. He must be. Otherwise he could not be our mediator. He could not represent God to us. Nor could he offer to the Father perfect obedience on our behalf.

At the same time, he is fully human, like us in every way except sin. He must be, so that he can represent us to God. In order to save us, the eternal Son of God took flesh and became one of us. He lived a sinless life, and offered himself on the cross a perfect sacrifice for sin. This is the good news. This is our hope! People need to know who Jesus is!"

"Don't worry, Nick. I'm on it."

"Good. And make sure Christmas is about celebrating the mystery of the Incarnation, when the Word became flesh. Make it about the baby who was God, laid in a manger. You've got to get people to see past the decorations and the presents, so that they adore the Savior. You tell them Santa said so!"

"Thanks, Santa. I will."

We talked more, but that was the part I needed to share with you. Santa—I mean, Nicholas—wouldn't let me pay for his meal or mine. Based on the exuberant "thank you" he got from the waitress, I'd say Santa is a good tipper. When I left to begin my drive him, he was chatting with the young couple about the beauty of love and the sanctity of marriage.

Why study the Essential Tenets?

- Because these are the biblical truths upon which we live and die.
- Because knowing these basic truths is a way to love God.
- Because it will make you a better disciple of Jesus.
- Because everyone who has a significant leadership role in our congregation has to agree with the Essential Tenets.
- They keep our church faithful.
- Who should come? Everyone!
- Especially elders and deacons.
- Especially people who are becoming or might become elders and deacons.
- Especially people who will never be elders or deacons.
- But mostly everyone.

Class Schedule?

- Nine classes beginning January 6 and ending March 10.
- We will not have class on January 27 because of the ECO National Gathering earlier that week.



Study after study tells us that people are more likely to attend or participate in a church service in December than any other time of year. There's something about

the Christmas season that allows an 'openness' for those who haven't yet made a serious commitment to participation in a local church. Part of the challenge for churches like ours is offering something that will speak to them and draw them into a closer relationship with both Christ and His Church. "What Child Is This?" by Joel Raney is one of those opportunities. This year, our choir is performing this work as their annual Cantata on December 17th during our 8:30 and 11:00 a.m. worship services. Featuring our Chancel Choir, Festival Orchestra, organ, narrators, and soloists, it is


