T'm going to San Antonio October 11-14. It's the annual meeting of the board for Presbyterians Protecting Life (PPL). This year will be my first to serve on the board, and I am happy to do so because PPL has meant a lot to me.

The mission of PPL is: "Compelled by the gospel, PPL equips Presbyterians to champion human life at every stage." This mission is important to me because of some basic Christian convictions I cherish and because I see so much threat to life in our world today.

I believe, for example, that every human being is made in the image of God. Therefore, every human being has worth and dignity. A person who is old and sick, a person who is handicapped, a person who is cognitively impaired, a person who has not yet been born—all have worth and dignity. I believe that God gives life and that only God has the right to take innocent life. (God has conferred on lawful authority the right to take guilty life —Romans 13:4.) I do not have the right to take even my own life. After all, I did not create myself.

I also believe that every human being is a person. You may think, "Of course. That's so obvious, why would you need to say it?" Because it is not obvious. Our society now has a moral foundation that distinguishes between human beings and persons. As Nancy Pearcey explains in her book *Love Thy Body*, "To be biologically human is a scientific fact. But to be a person is an ethical concept, defined by what we value" (p.19).

To take an obvious example, an unborn child is a human being, but by law is not a person. Justice Harry Blackmun wrote this in the 1973 Supreme Court ruling on Roe v. Wade: "The word 'person,' as used in the Fourteenth Amendment, does not include the unborn... If the suggestion of personhood is established...the fetus' right to life would then be guaranteed." [Roe v. Wade, 410 U.S. 113 (1973)]

So who else might not be a "person?" It seems every ethicist gives a different answer. Once you draw a line between "human being" and "person," the difference becomes a matter of debate. Most make a "quality of life" argument. When a society begins making these distinctions, those who are least able to stand up for themselves —those with dementia, the disabled, and the mentally ill—are endangered.

Euthanasia is now legal in some states. As I mentioned in a recent sermon (quoting from Pearcey's book, p. 90), in one study, only 24% of those who wanted to die gave debilitating pain as a reason. In contrast, 91% feared "loss of autonomy." I fear we will become like Belgium, where even children are euthanized, and 1.7% of deaths are "hastened deaths without explicit request." (see https://www.lifenews.com/2018/07/25/belgium-euthanizes-hundreds-of-disabled-and-mentally-disabled-people-including-three-children/)

"Hastened deaths without explicit request" is the fanciest euphemism for murder I have ever heard! I see human life being devalued in so many ways. It is both more scientific and more Christian to affirm that every human being is a person, and every person deserves to live.

I like other things about PPL too. I like our compassionate approach. We are a grace-filled ministry. For example, women who have had abortions (and men who have been involved) often feel afraid to share this with fellow Christians for fear of being rejected. (In some churches, this fear is well-founded.) What they need, however, is grace and healing. PPL equips churches to make this grace-filled response.

• PPL assists churches wanting to care for women and their children in the womb.

• We train leaders for post-abortion recovery ministry within the framework of a Reformed and Presbyterian theology of grace.

• PPL encourages adoption from a theological foundation—as a redemptive, life-giving means to provide two-parent families for children whose birthmothers are unready or unable to parent.

• We produce sexuality resources that challenge and teach young and old to offer pure hearts and pure lives to God.

• PPL publishes biblically grounded educational resources from a Reformed and Presbyterian perspective to inform and equip local congregations for effective, life-affirming ministry.



#### Understanding the Time Between Testaments

Understanding the setting to which Jesus comes is essential to understanding His ministry and teaching amongst us.




